Residential exodus

Clifton became a more popular place to live in the 1800s, Many St. Paul's residents moved there, but factories and workshops filled their now empty former homes.

A war-torn community

St. Paul's didn't escape the Bristol Blitz and the devastation it caused is still evident on the corner of Portland Sa. Many moved to safer areas, if the could afford to.

The Windrush Generation

After the war. Britain was in dire need of help to rebuild. African-Carribean migrants answered the call, many of whom settled in St. Paul's. However. they were faced with discrimination and outright hostility on arrival.

The Bristol Bus Boycott In 1963, an action group called for a boycott of Bristol's buses because of a colour-bar on new drivers. Its success paved the way for important law and

societal change.

6 The Black and White Cafe

Bertram Wilk's opened the Cafe in 1971, offering Caribbean food and a social hub for a left-behind community. Allegedly a drug den, it was the most police-raided cafe in England, It closed in 2004 and was later demolished.

The St. Paul's uprising

In 1980, police raided the Black and White Cafe but heavy-handedness was blamed for the violent unrest that followed. The notorious event was a wake-up call for Britain's police.

St. Paul's Church is now home to Circomedia, a circus school. It provides a sanctuary physical theatre and the increased footfall to the area has contributed to reducing crime and revitalising the community.

When architect Daniel Hague built his "gothick" masterpiece St. Paul's Church, the crowning jewel of the Grade I listed Portland Square, he founded a parish which became a sanctuary for marginalised people that has improved countless lives and enriched Bristol's cultural landscape

St. Paul's African-Caribbean community have called this parish home since the "Windrush Generation" arrived in Britain. For decades this community has been a powerful voice for equality and driven social change despite experiencing prejudice and adversity.
