

BOUDICCA WAY

This leaflet is a partnership between the Boudicca Way and the Churches Conservation Trust.

The Boudicca Way is a long distance footpath which runs for approximately 36 miles between Diss and Norwich. Running roughly parallel with the old Roman 'Pye' Road, now the A140, the route follows public rights of way and quiet country roads, stopping off in picturesque villages such as Pulham Market, Saxlingham Nethergate and Shotesham along the way.

The Boudicca Way is named after the legendary warrior Queen of the Iceni, whose tribes once inhabited the area, and passes through the beautiful, unspoilt rural countryside of South Norfolk and the Waveney Valley where visitors will find sites where unusual wildlife and flora are present.

The Norfolk Countryside








In the village of Burston is the Strike School, which was at the centre of the longest running strike in British history, running from 1914 - 1939. The strike began when teachers at the village's school were sacked and schoolchildren went on strike in their support. The former school building now houses a museum.



St Andrew's Church, Frenze: This simple church, dating back to the 13th century, sits prettily in a farmyard setting. It is a modest building with a Tudor brick porch and a bell-cote.





Away from the village, down a track through fields, Shimpling has a lovely view towards a nearby wood. With its Norman round tower, and little spire, it is essentially a beautifully-proportioned building. St George's is also in the care of The Churches Conservation Trust and is open daily.



St Andrew's Church, Thelveton, is a beautiful spot to come to find peace, to have a picnic, or to enjoy the tranquil churchyard.
